The Amar Nath Sehgal Private Collection is a repository of sculptures and artworks and archives of the South Asian Modern artist, Amar Nath Sehgal. This year marks the centenary year of the artist. We are a single artist museum, the only one of its kind in the country.

The collection is located in the quaint locality of Jangpura, which was the artist's studio. Our rich archives of extensive documentation is the foundation of our museum.

We are here to create a deeper awareness and appreciation of the artist's contribution to the world over 6 decades of his life time. Through scholarships to budding artists, research, documentation and collaborations, we intend to create a dialogue between the art of the past and the future generations.

The Sehgal Collection is dedicated to preserving art and educating the community we are building.

### **Amar Nath Sehgal**

Amarnath Sehgal, born on 5th February 1922, was an internationally acclaimed sculptor, possessing versatile personality, who excelled in painting, graphics, poetry and tapestries. He was India's cultural ambassador, an artist wedded to the social cause, with reminiscences of partition horror intensely seizing the artist's psyche, which got strong manifestation in his art works. Amarnath Sehgal initially did engineering but his artistic aptitude and urge gave him impetus to join Mayo School of Art. Later he did Masters in art education from the School of Education, New York University.

He came back to India in 1953 and got an important assignment from the Government of India -to organize a pilot project for the revival of folk arts at Jharsa district, Haryana, and was invited to work as an art consultant to the Ministry of Development & Cooperation. For his extraordinary contributions in the field of art, he received many honours, the most prestigious being the Padma Bhushan conferred on him by the Government of India in the year 2008.

It is a matter of pleasure and pride that we are organizing an exhibition- 'A Life in Black & White-Amarnath Sehgal' which will showcase his paperwork, unfolding his artistic expression in a medium less known to the art world. This exhibition is being organized by Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts in collaboration with the family of Shri Sehgal which has Amarnath Sehgal Private Collection, on the occasion of the centenary year celebration of the artist, which commenced in 2022. Besides the paperwork, the sculptures of Amarnath Sehgal in the collection of IGNCA are also being showcased. The exhibition will surely prove to be a visual treat for the art lovers, art connoisseur and scholars.

Amar Nath Sehgal (5th February 1922 - 27th December 2007), the celebrated multifaceted artist, made an everlasting impression on the scenario of contemporary Indian art, with his intense sensitive artistic manifestation of the petrified self, having deep roots in his encounter with holocaust which followed partition of India and Pakistan in 1947. The anguish, pain, suffering, trauma which mankind underwent, is felt with a vigour even today in his art works which shakes us with the same intensity, creating empathy with the artist's appalled self. The exhibition-'Life in Black & White- Amar Nath Sehgal', unfolds a treasure of rare art works of the artist on paper. Black & White series of Amar Nath Sehgal is impinged with poignant abstract idiom, executed with spontaneous, vigorous lines and strokes, with terror- stricken eyes and cries loaded with agony, narrates the partition horrors and possesses sculptural quality as a watermark of the artist. 'Estrangement' manifested with a few powerful strokes is exemplary of the artist's propensity in expressionistic allegory with minimized visual vocabulary

### A Life in Black and White by Amar Nath Sehgal

#### **Curatorial Note**

To understand the art, one must understand the artist.

Amar Nath Sehgal was born in the colonial era, year 1922. He was witness to the end of the colonial rule, the divide of his home and birth of a new nation, all at a young age. For an artist who takes inspiration from his surroundings, there was chaos, tragedy and loss that would later translate into his work. His sketches from 1946 are a compilation of local and mundane life, which style of art he learnt at the Mayo school of art. He captures the essence of the quiet and the ordinary.

Sehgal took to drawing, not as an artist but an architect with a vision. He built bold forms in his sculptures, from his imagination, that he first delivered on paper. For a poor artist with no studio space, a sketchbook was all he could use. In his travel to America, one can see the landscapes and the scenery he draws all from around him that over the two years there evolves into abstract forms. These abstract forms have been extracted into 3 dimensional forms of various mediums.

Unlike many artists, Sehgal never got fixated or had a muse. He believed his art had a purpose, a greater good to serve. He created lines to inspire its viewers. The boldness in it, the colour of black, with fierce strokes is a language he created by himself for himself. These were made in solitary for his friendship was with the forms he created.

The relationship he shared with the colour was one for a lifetime the grows more confidently over the years. The colour while stark, never wavers in his form. His lines, thick or thin, show no doubt in his deliverance, as though he submitted his conscious thought to his pen.

The curated collection for this show has come together for the first time. He had never intended for these paperwork to become his means of income. Most found unframed in his studio after his passing, these works have woven a story that pieces together the larger picture of an artist's life.

"My motivation is that I try to grasp the spirit of humanity in any way I can-either by synthesizing or symbolizing a concept. Once I have the concept in mind, that gives me the form." (Amarnath Sehgal, Famous Sculptor back in Town, The Gulf News, 8th September 1980).

### **Amar Nath Sehgal**


In Campbellpur, Pre Partition India, South Asian Modern artist Amar Nath Sehgal was born on 5th February 1922 to Ram Asra Mal and Parmeshwari Devi, the middle child of the seven children. He was had a conventional education that led him to pursue a degree in Industrial Chemistry and Physics. Sehgal learnt to appreciate art as a child, but his conventional education led him to pursue a degree in Industrial Chemistry and Physics.


His urge for the artistic pursuit pushed him to enroll in evening classes at the Mayo School of Art in Lahore. B.C. Sanyal was his mentor and teacher. After 1947, he moved to a new India, where he spent two years in the Kullu valley. Soon after, he left for New York, to pursue a degree in art education at the New York University where he studied art education. He worked in 7 jobs to make ends meet. America gave him the opportunity to work with artists such as Jackson Pollock and Tony Smith opened their studio spaces to work out of and further influenced his artistic pursuit.


He returned to India after three years and worked relentlessly for over a decade on the revival of folk art and theatre in rural areas of Northern India like Nilokheri in Punjab and Jharsa in Haryana with the Ministry of Community Development. He spent 10 years of his life in educating and reviving tribal art communities in a post-colonial time.

Sehgal travelled extensively both in India and abroad. The artist's sensitivity was quick to respond to the victims of natural calamities, wars, and poverty. The remembrance of the tragic events he had witnessed during the Partition is stamped on his works. Most of his works with their simple but highly expressive forms portraying human emotions – be it anguish, helplessness, oppression or a yearning for hope – vibrate a perceptible pathos.


Amar Nath Sehgal's artistic versatility extends to sculptures, paintings, poetry, graphics and tapestries. His works can be found in public and private collections all over the world like the Musée d'art Moderne de la Ville de Paris, the 20th Century Museum of Vienna and Berlin, the Israel Museum, the National Gallery of Modern Art and the White House among others.





























































Hunger, Bronze,1962, Permanent Collection, IGNCA
